Managers' Report

This is my first annual report having succeeded Bob Pooler last year. I would like to express my gratitude to Bob for the fifteen years' service he gave to Roundabout and leaving it as one of the leading furniture reuse charities in the area.

The year under review has been very eventful and has seen substantial changes and hopefully improvement to our service provision.

One of the biggest changes was the decision by Roundabout to employ an apprentice in September 2014.

In order to improve our ability to deliver referred furniture items and collect furniture donations I recognised the need to introduce afternoon deliveries and collections. In comparison to other similar charities the ratio of paid staff to volunteers is very small and historically Roundabout has been able to rely on a bank of loyal volunteers to undertake the majority of tasks. Occasionally, there is a shortage of volunteers to undertake key roles and so the decision to employ an apprentice to fill these roles and assist in afternoon deliveries and collections made good business sense.


Roundabout has been extremely lucky in appointing Paul Byatt as Roundabout's first apprentice. Paul has exceeded expectations and he has consistently demonstrated his ability to undertake virtually all roles within the organisation. In addition to assisting Roundabout Paul is completing a Level 2 Business Studies NVQ administered through South Worcestershire College.


Another significant change has been the decision to open the shop and warehouse to the public on the first Saturday of the month; this was in response to demand and feedback that often the public were denied the opportunity to attend Roundabout during the week as the opening hours are too restrictive. The first Saturday of the month opening took place in February 2015 and proved to be an instant success and has continued. I must give a special thankyou to the small band of volunteers and the staff members who also volunteer and who have made the Saturday opening a reality.

In the shop area there has been significant structural changes with the walk through to the warehouse and the introduction of a counter and till system.

In performance terms, the year under review has been very successful. Roundabout has made 1289 collections of donated furniture items with a High Street value of £2,105,000.

Roundabout has completed 529 referrals of furniture and other essential items to those in need across Worcestershire, North Gloucestershire and West Warwickshire. As a result of our activities approximately 140 tonnes of furniture items has been diverted from landfill along with the reduction in CO2 emissions.





Although Roundabout has had a successful year I must sound a word of caution. The furniture reuse sector is becoming crowded with new and existing charities appealing to the public for their surplus furniture items and so we cannot afford to be complacent.

At the beginning of 2015 Roundabout conducted a survey with service users in order to ascertain how they first heard of Roundabout. The choices given were Media reports/Advertising, Roundabout Website, Facebook, Word of Mouth. Overwhelmingly word of mouth was the most popular response and so although there may be tough trading times ahead I would like to think Roundabout is equipped to meet the challenges and can continue to prosper.

I would like to thank Fortis Living Housing Association, John Martin's charity, Worcestershire County Council (Councillor Alistair Adams) and Wychavon District Council for their financial support. Last but not least I would like to thank all of the Roundabout Volunteers, Staff and Trustees for their hard work and support.

Paul Byatt Roundabout Apprentice

"After completing my GCSEs I attended South Worcestershire College for 2 years studying for a National Diploma in IT Practitioners, hoping for a job in IT once I had finished my 2 years.

Once the 2 years were completed I found it hard to find a job not only in IT but in all work sectors. I finally got a job at 19 but this was only a 6 month contract so once it had ended I had to find work again. Ever since then I have been in and out of work.

I started a work placement at Roundabout in June 2014 learning the ropes helping out in the warehouse for my first few days then being moved into the contact centre. Once in the office I started to thrive and improve in the skills required for the contact centre.

When I was coming to the end of my placement I became aware that Roundabout had advertised for an apprentice. In August 2014 I was invited for an interview and then subsequently offered the position of Roundabout's first

apprentice.

I commenced my apprenticeship on the 1st September 2014.

During my apprenticeship I have worked in all areas including the warehouse, shop, admin office and contact centre and I am now competent to work in all areas without supervision.

Each afternoon I go out on the delivery van delivering referred furniture items or collecting donated

items. I attend South Worcestershire College every alternate Wednesday to complete a workshop and to complete my apprenticeship course work which will lead to a Level 2 Business Studies NVQ.

Since my first day at Roundabout I have never looked back and have enjoyed every minute. I needed to get myself a job to grow as a person and Roundabout have given me that chance and I feel I have thrived".

Volunteers

Volunteers are the life blood of Roundabout and without volunteers Roundabout would cease to exist. Roundabout currently has over 50 active volunteers.

During the period under review several key long standing volunteers moved on, primarily through retirement or relocation. Through a link up with the local Job Centre Plus, Roundabout has seen a succession of volunteers offering their services. It has been most rewarding when a long term unemployed volunteer has achieved paid employment having gained their confidence and skills through Roundabout.

Below are comments made by some of the Volunteers who have joined Roundabout during the last year:

Amy Baldwin (25yrs)

"During my 10 months of volunteering at Roundabout, I have seen the numbers of volunteers and deliveries grow; they are helping countless more people than they were before.

After graduating from University, I found I wanted a break from stressful work, but at the same time I wanted to contribute to the community in a charitable way. I came across Roundabout, while researching charities in the area, and found that their charitable beliefs were something I felt I could help with. It enabled me to feel part of the community without being put under too much stress.

I have been deployed as a delivery driver delivering referred furniture items to those in need and making collections of donated furniture. Staff Training

All staff receive training for their respective roles with an induction package for new volunteers. The Health and Safety of staff is a very high priority at Roundabout. During the year Roundabout has implemented an anti-fraud and corruption policy and a safeguarding vulnerable adults and children policy.
